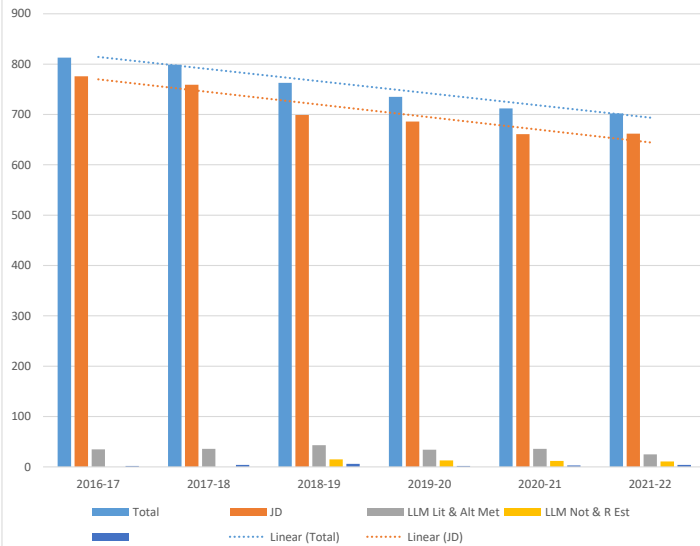

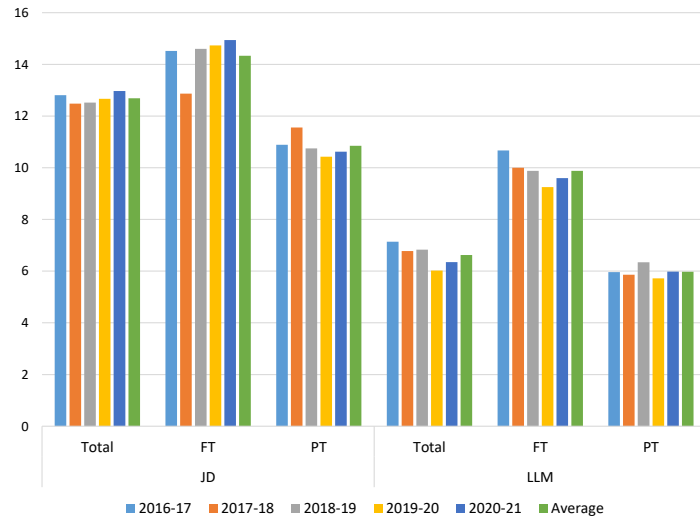

Enrolled Credit Hours for Full-Time and Part-Time Students by Degree



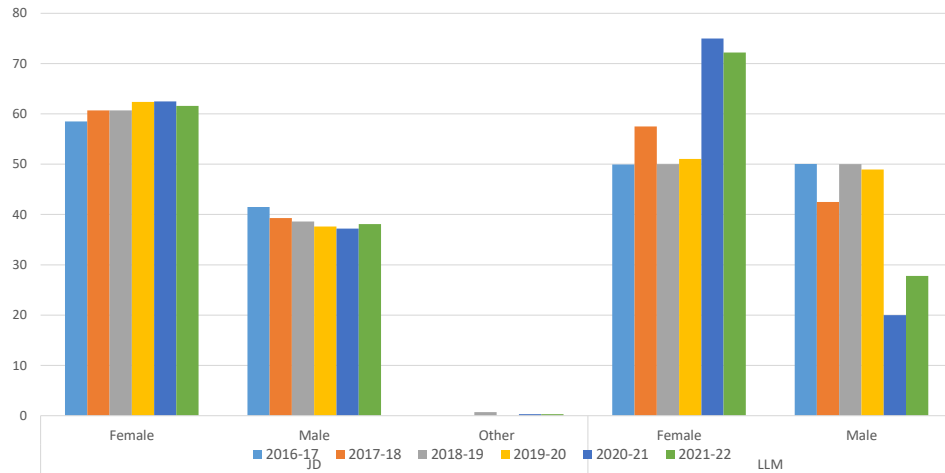

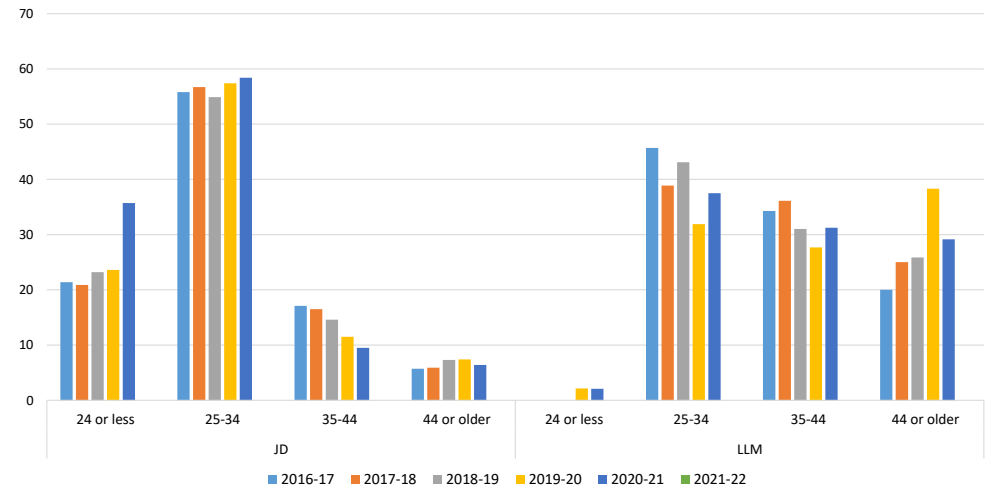

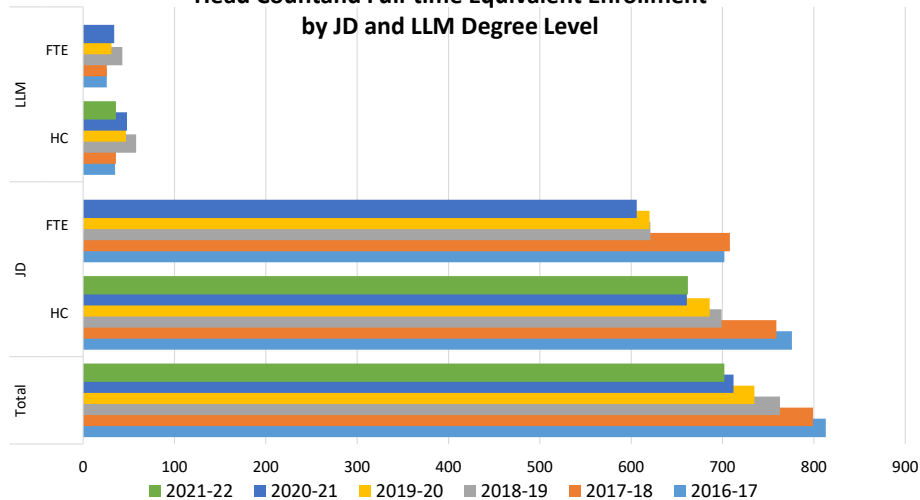
Gender Distribution by JD and LLM Degrees



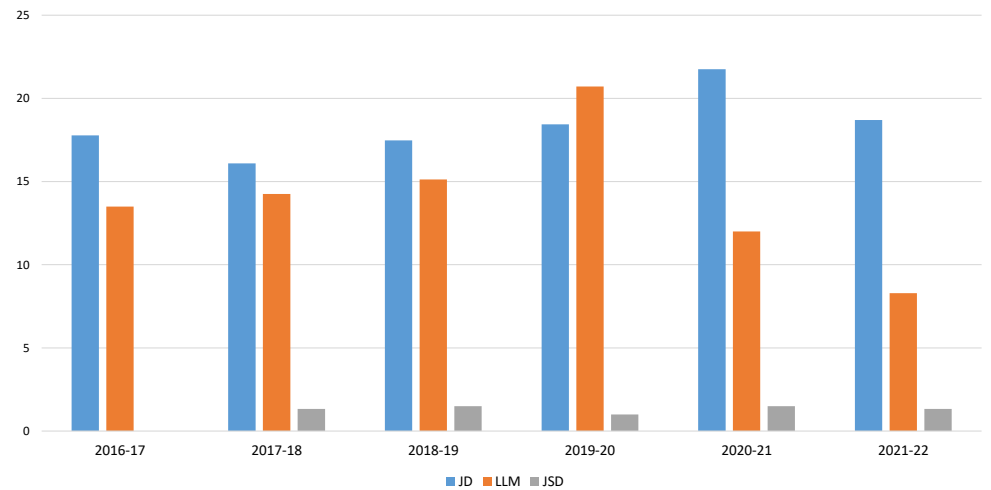
Age Distribution by JD and LLM Degrees



Head Count and Full-time Equivalent Enrollment by JD and LLM Degree Level



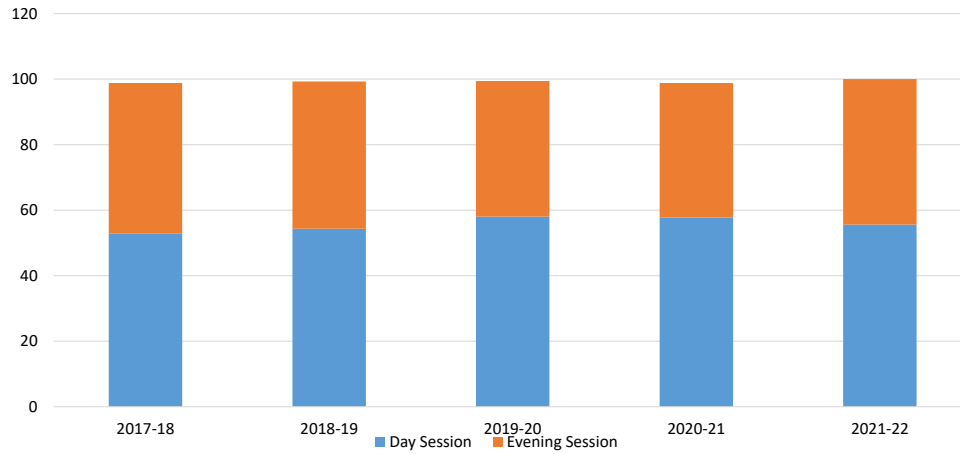

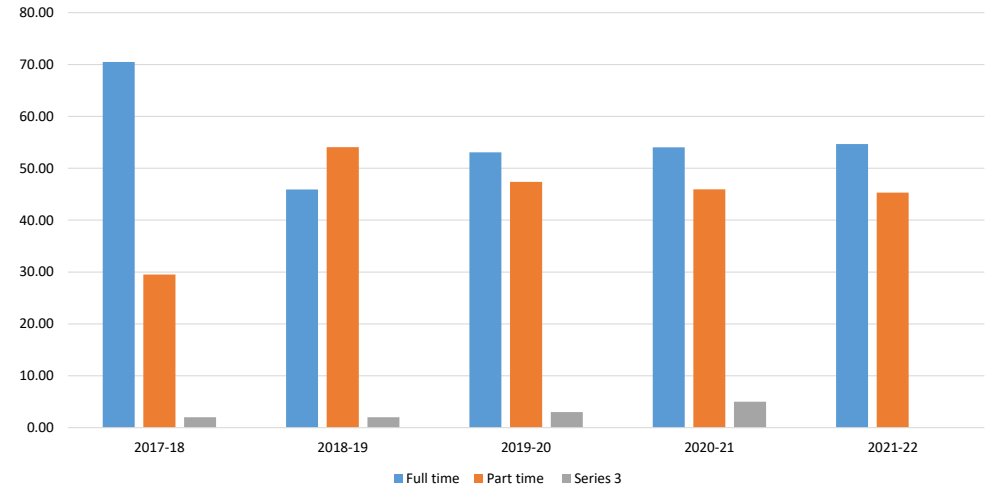

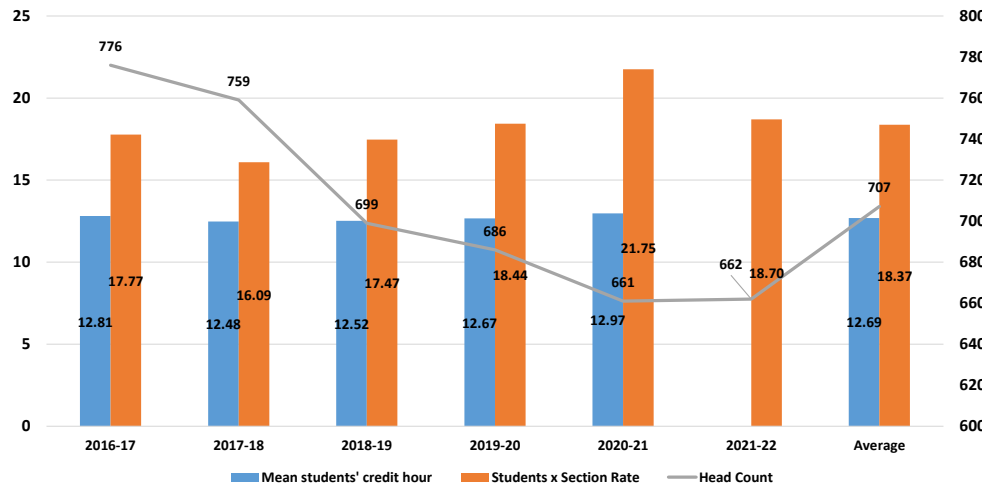
Percent of J.D. Students Enrolled by Day and Evening Sessions



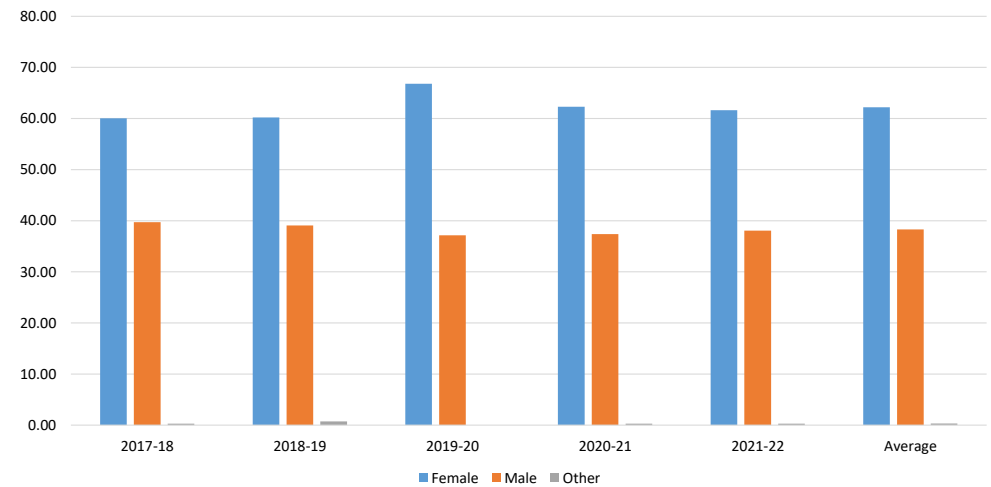
Percent of J.D. Students Enrolled by Academic Load Full and Part Time

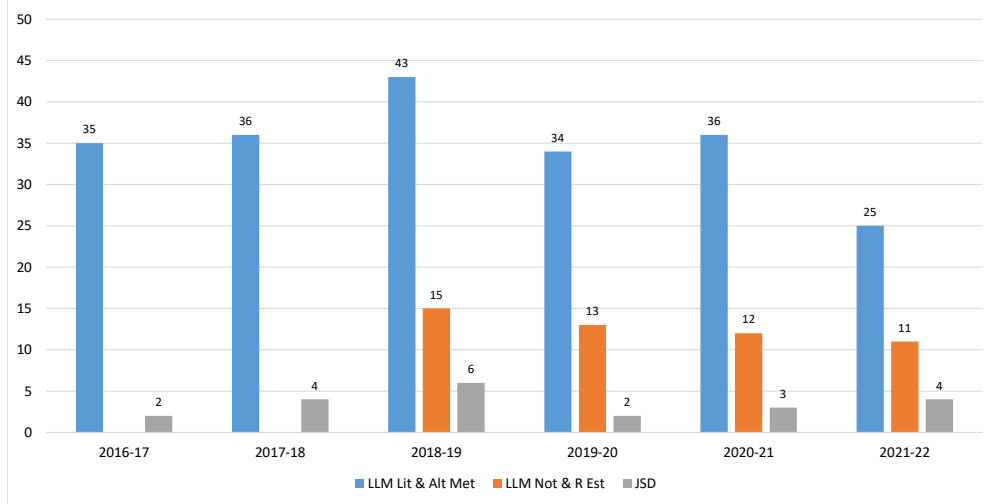
J.D. Gender Distribution on a Five Years Period



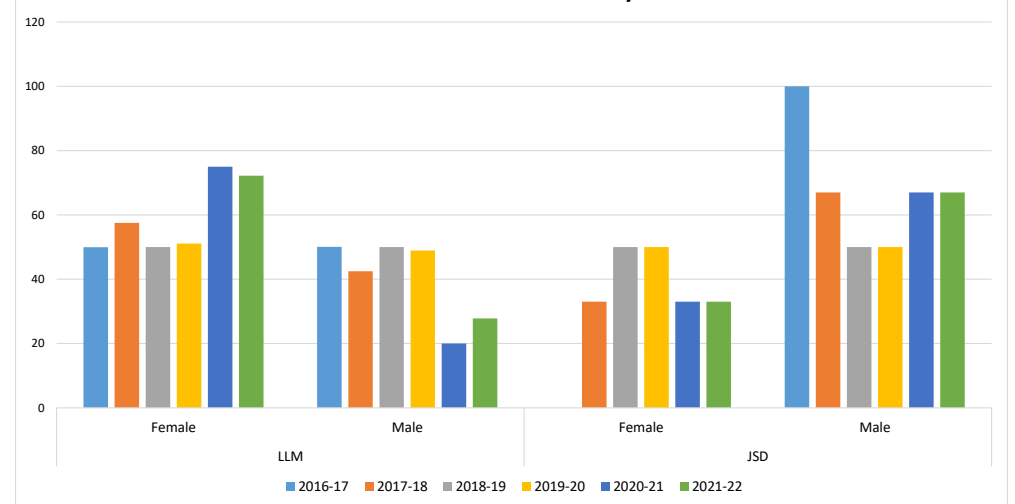

LL.M. and J.S.D. Distribution by Gender

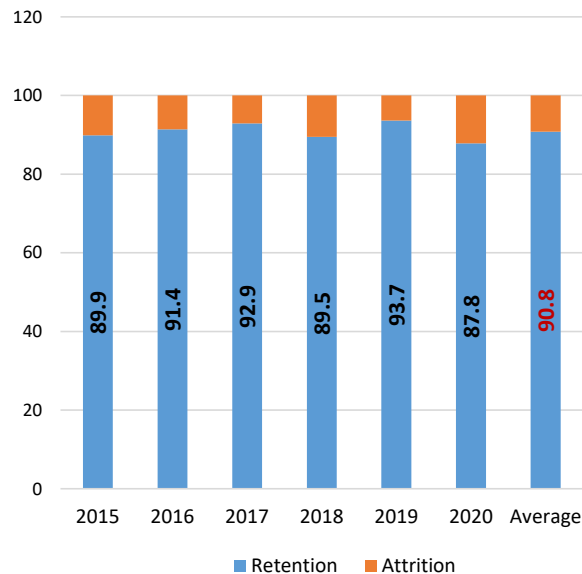


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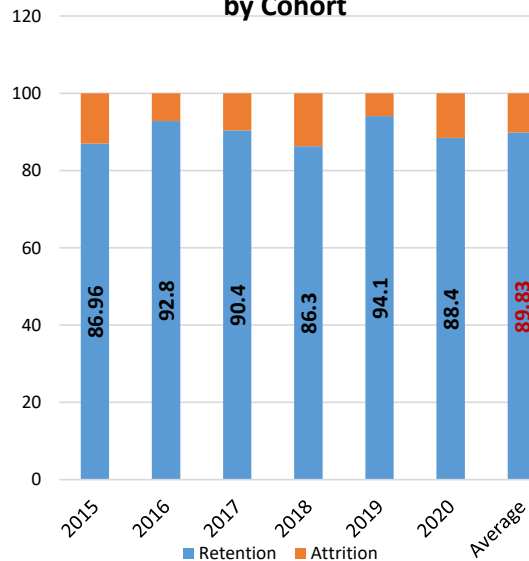

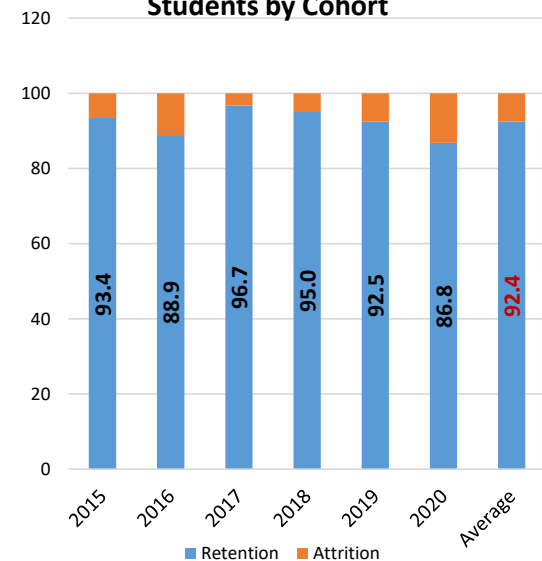
**Juris Doctor One Year Retention

by Cohort**



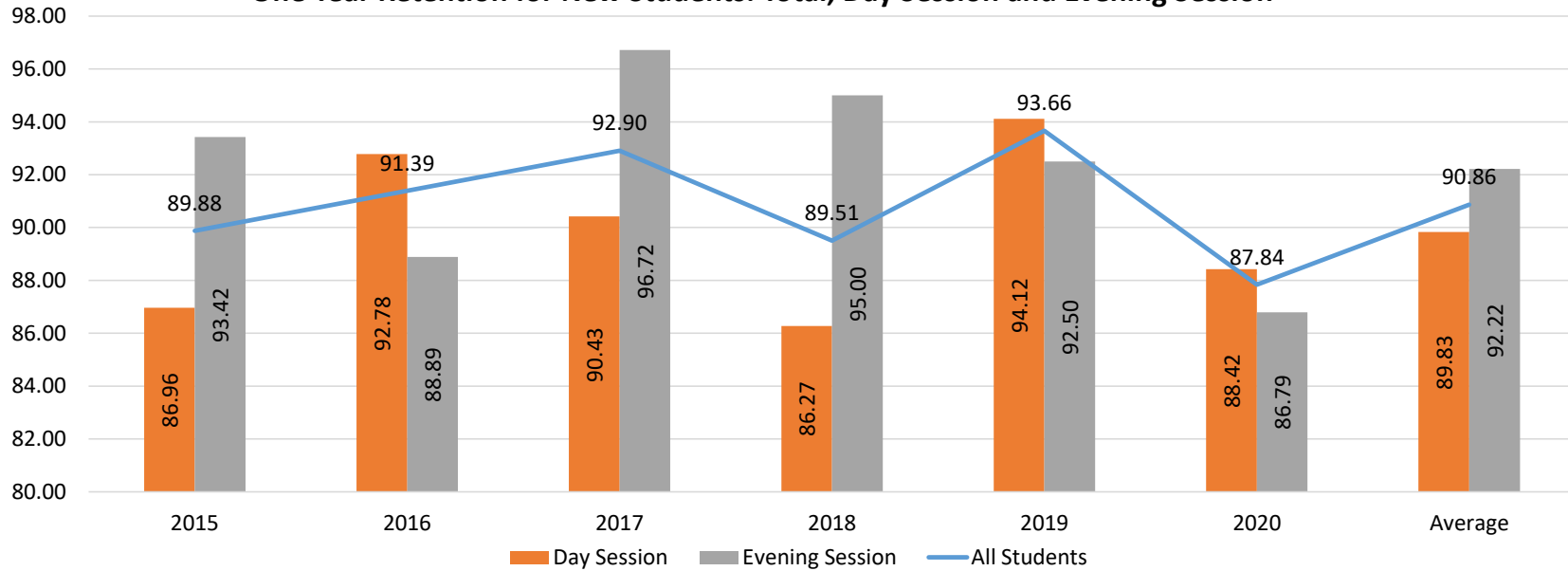
**Juris Doctor One Year Retention

Students by Cohort**



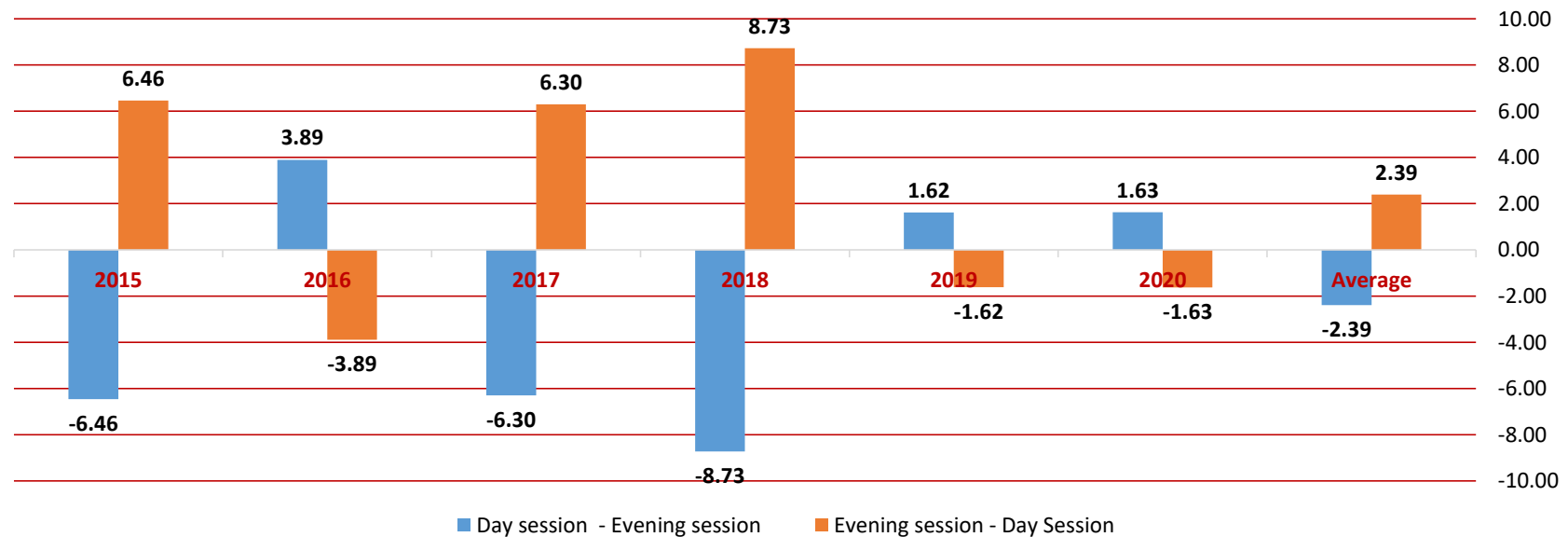

One Year Retention for New Students: Total, Day Session and Evening Session



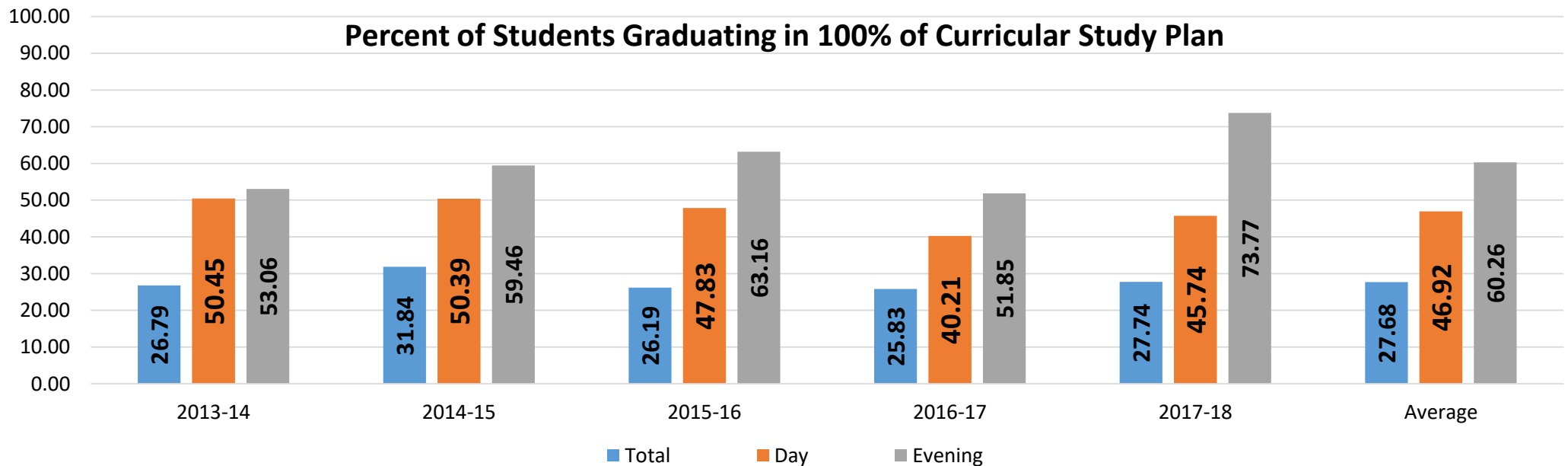
Difference of One Year Retention for New Day and Evening Sessions Students

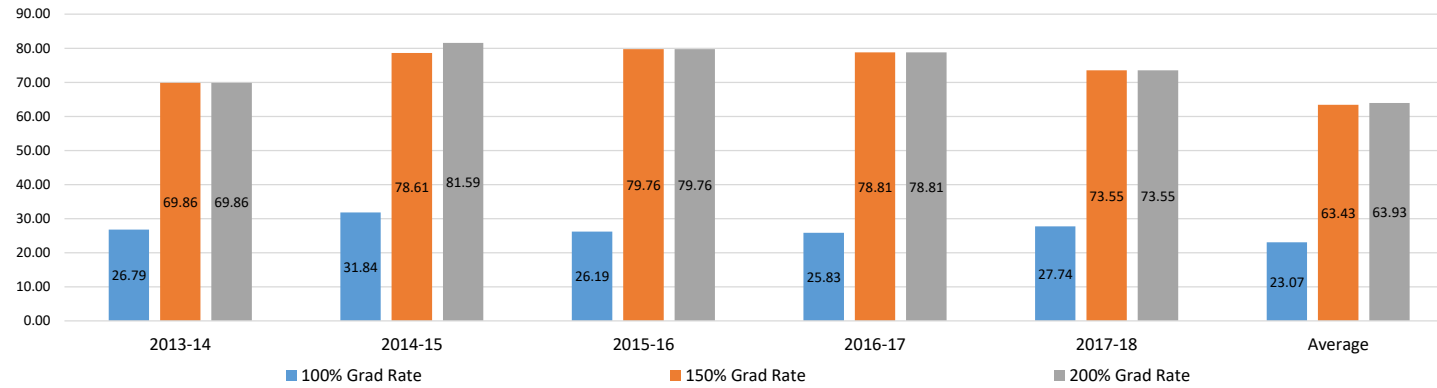


200 Graduation Rate Difference between Day and Evening Sessions

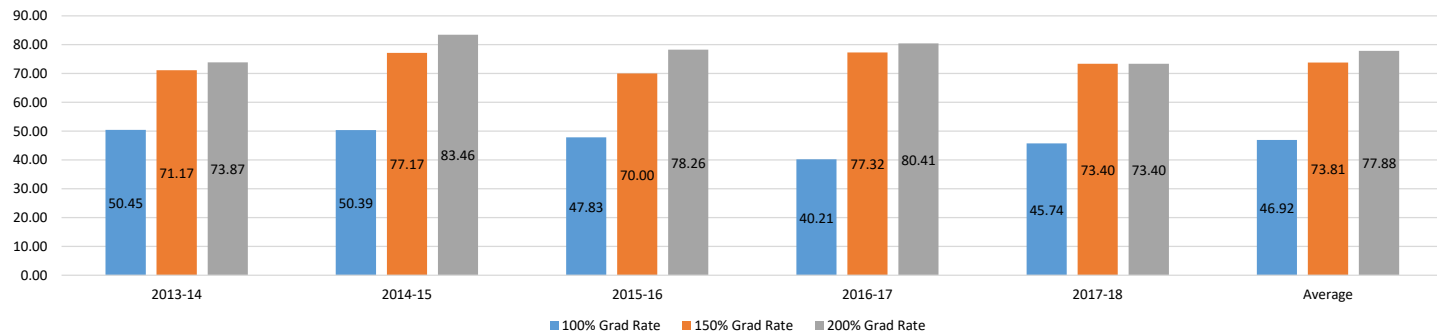

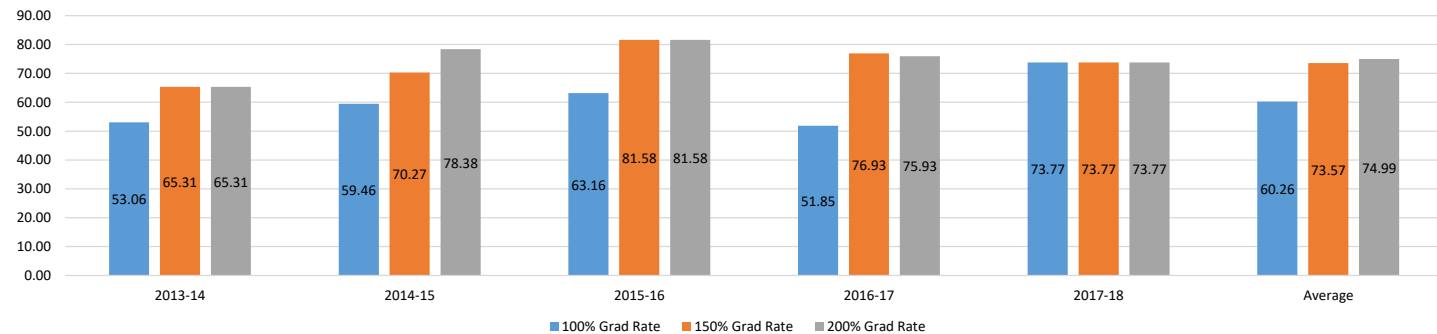
Juris Doctor Graduation Rate for All Students by Cohort and Earning Degree Time



Juris Doctor Graduation Rate for Day Session Students by Cohort and Earning Degree Time



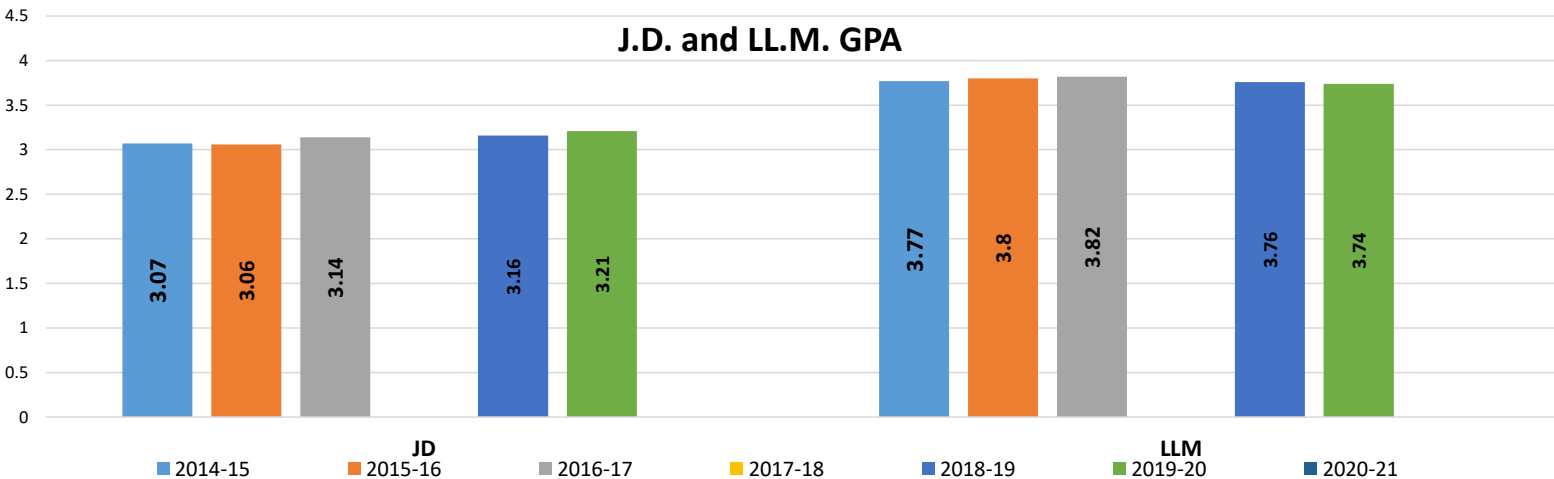
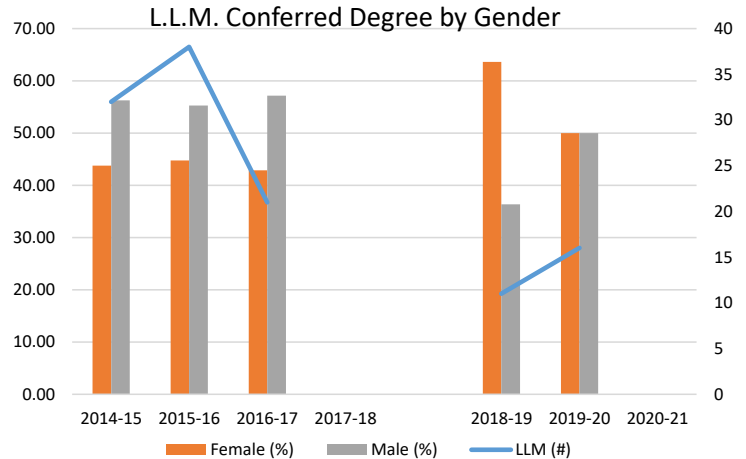
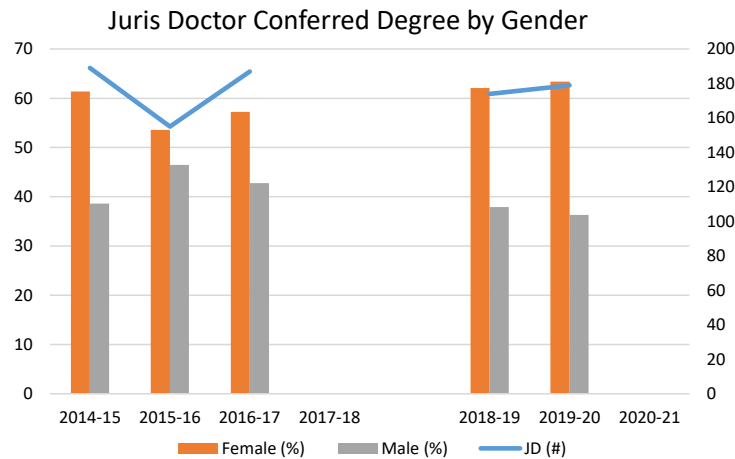
Juris Doctor Graduation Rate for Evening Session Students by Cohort and Earning Degree Time

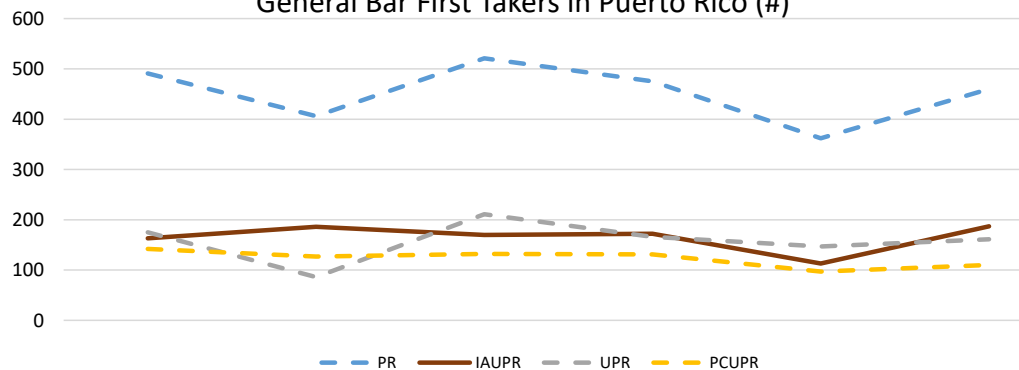

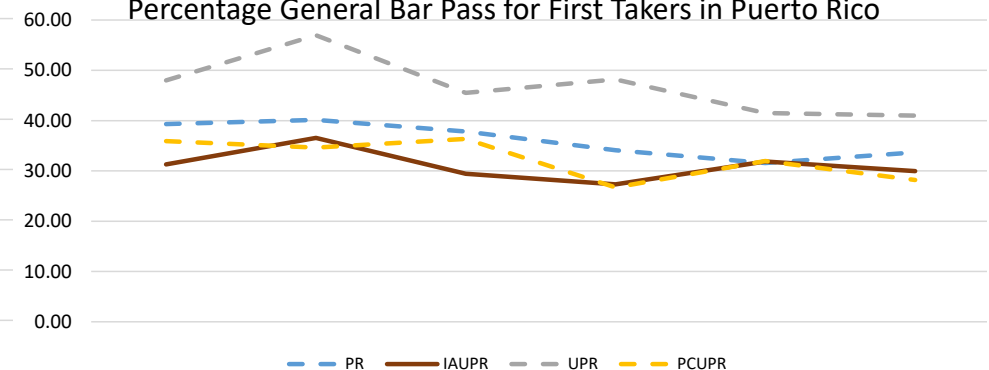

General Bar First Takers in Puerto Rico (#)



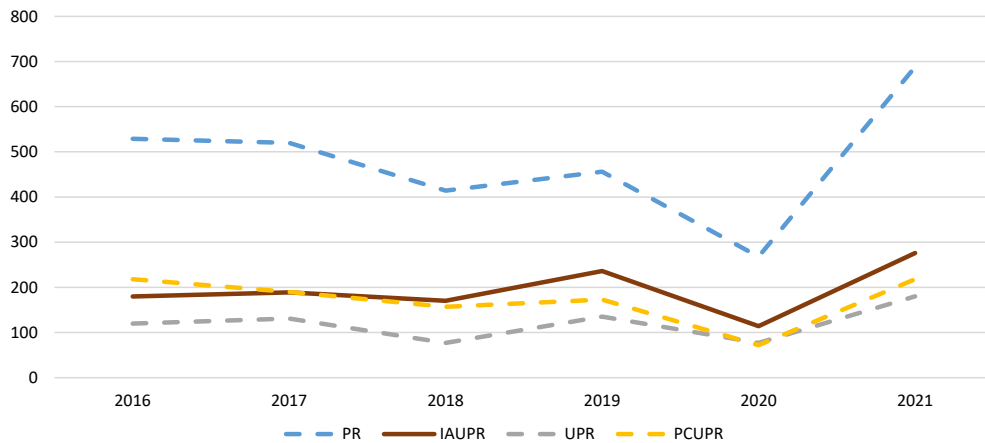
Percentage General Bar Pass for First Takers in Puerto Rico



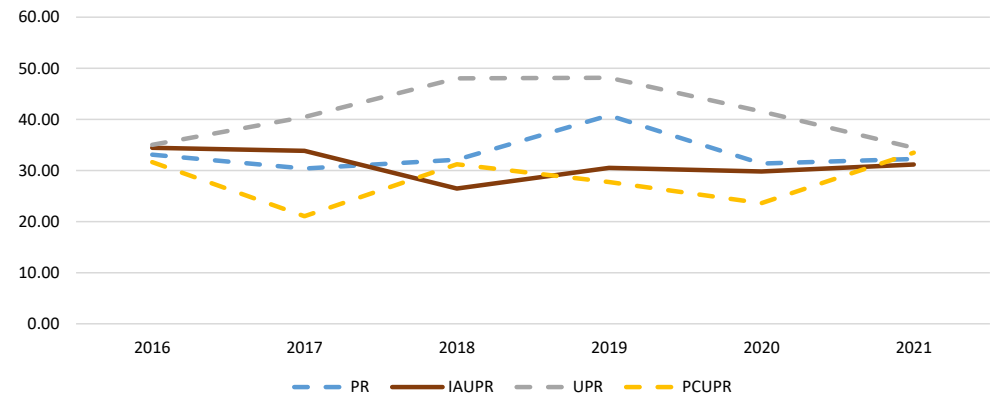

General Bar Repeaters Takers in Puerto Rico (#)



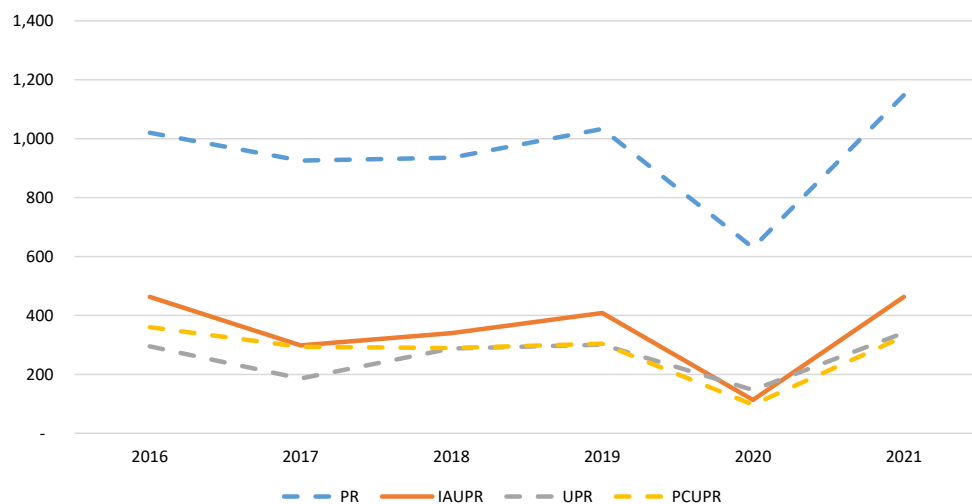
Percentage General Bar Pass for Repeaters Takers in Puerto Rico



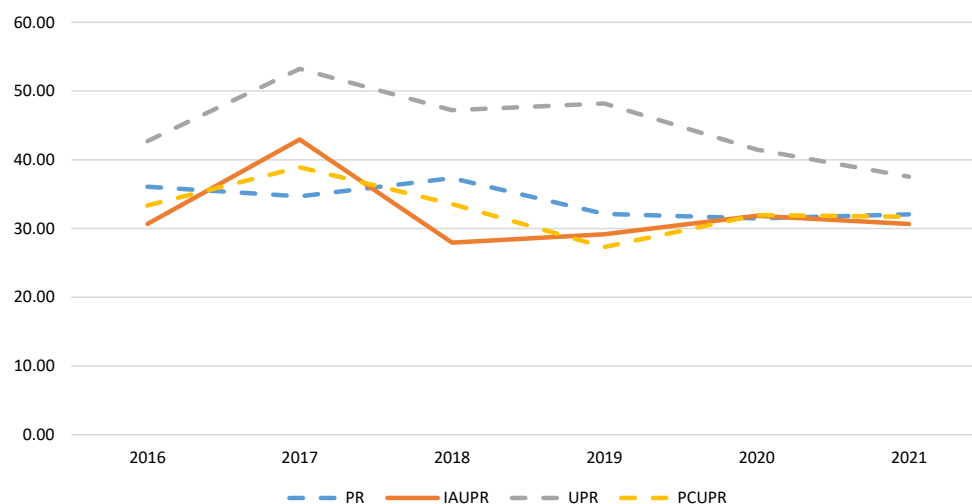

Percentage General Bar Pass for Takers in Puerto Rico



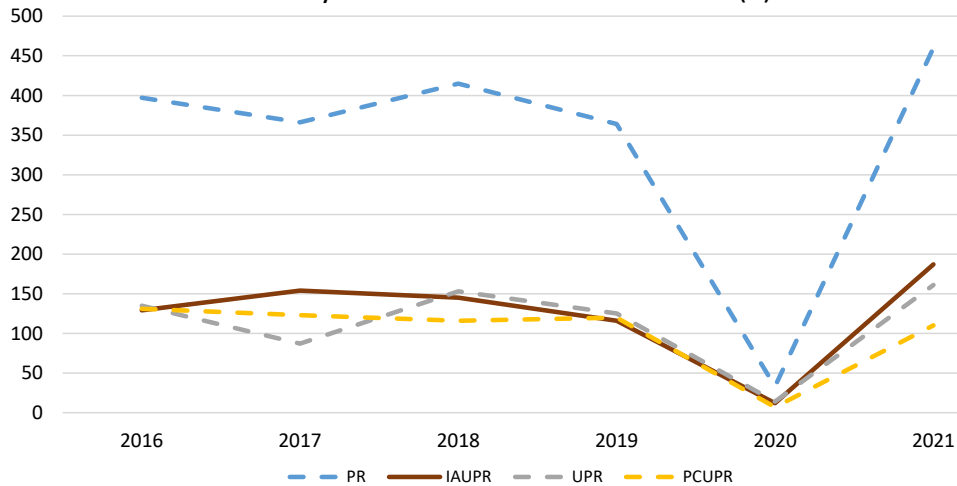

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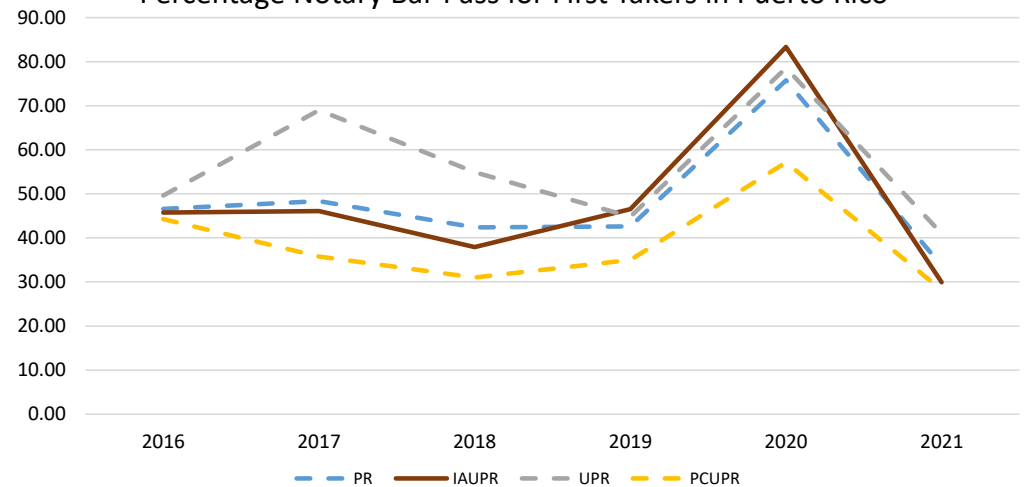

Notary Bar First Takers in Puerto Rico (#)



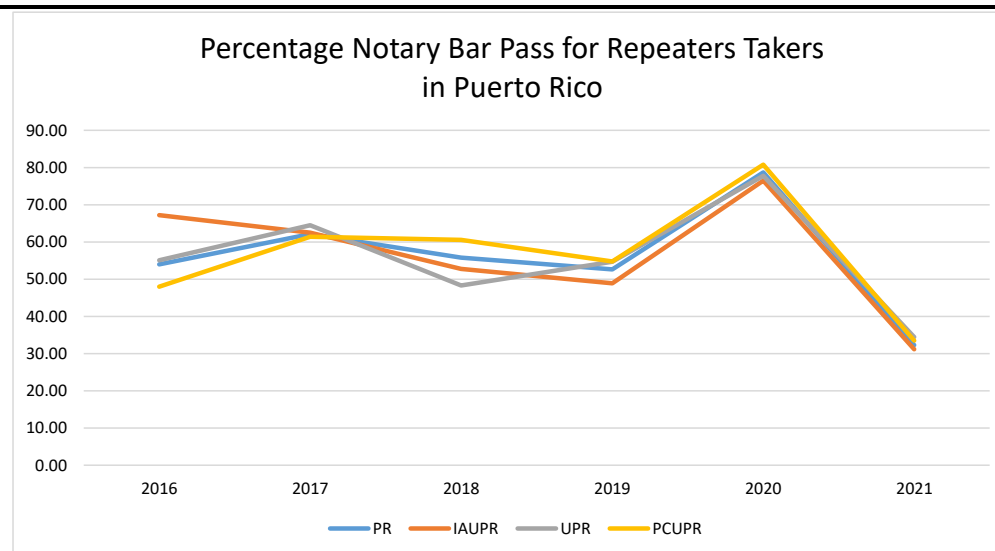
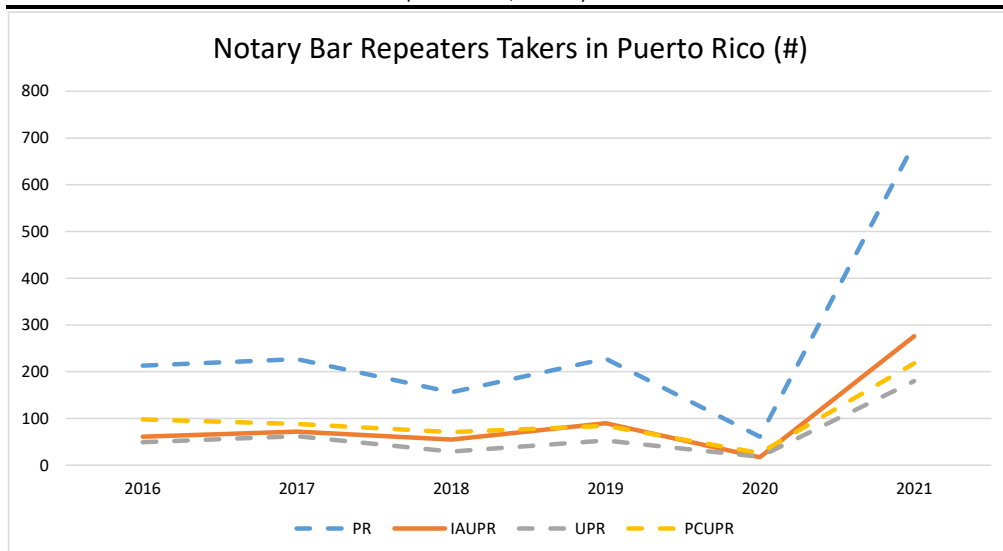
Percentage Notary Bar Pass for First Takers in Puerto Rico

First Takers Bar Pass Rate (%) in Puerto Rico by Law School



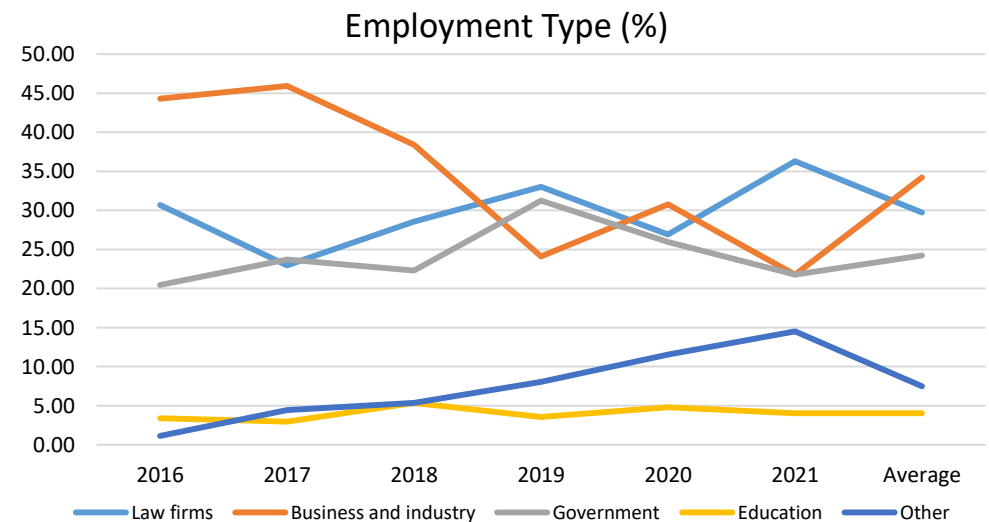
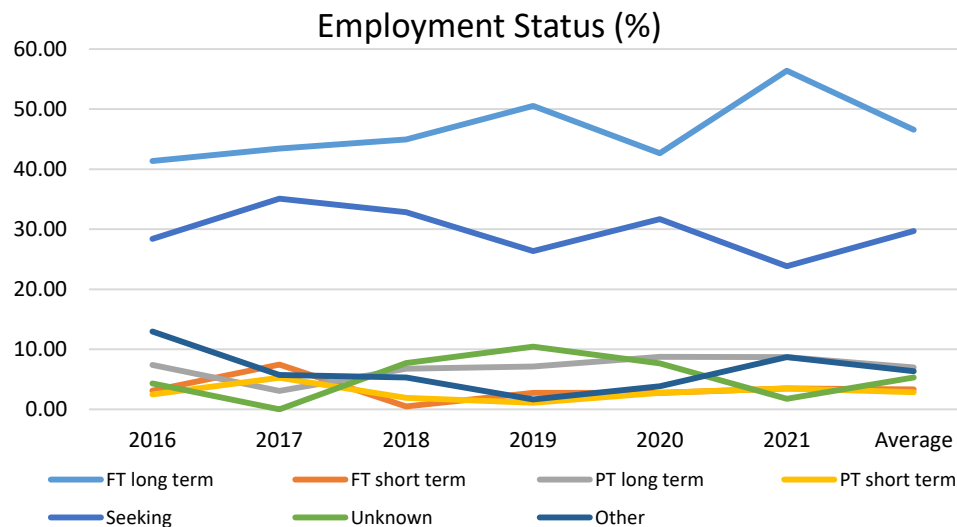
Ultimate Pass Two Years Rate (%) by Law School

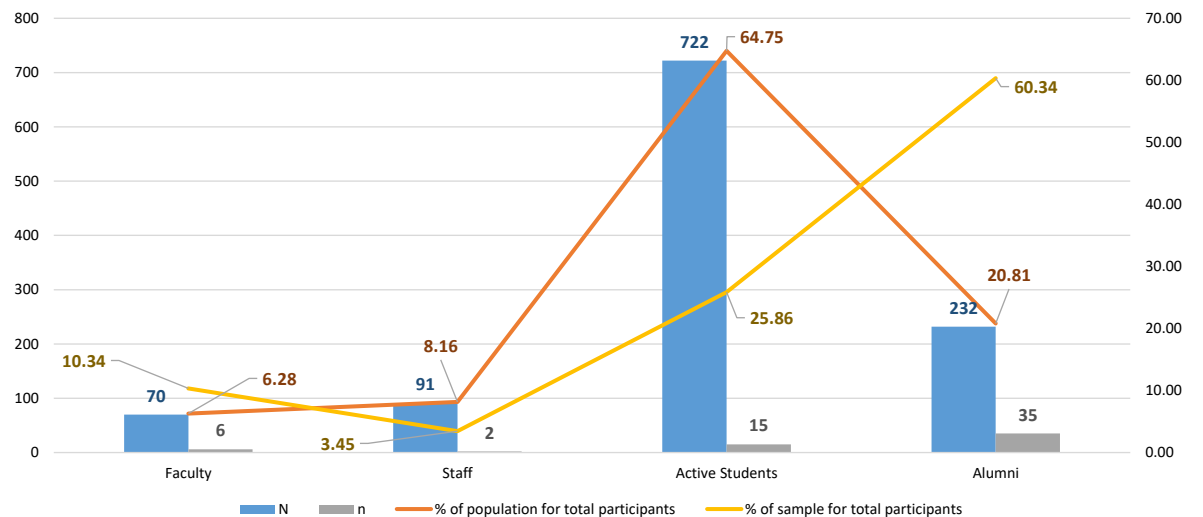

Participant Distribution for Constituents

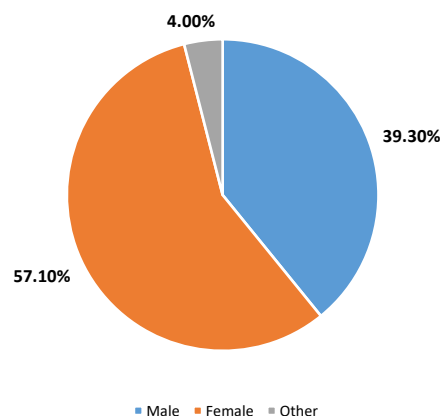

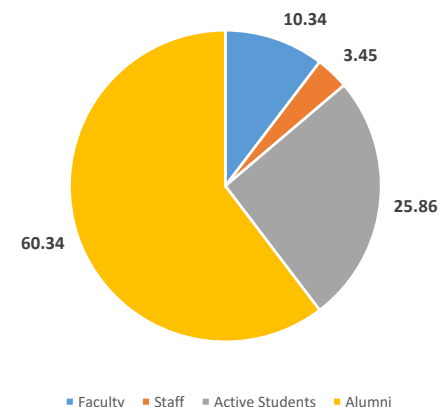
Participant Distribution for Constituents

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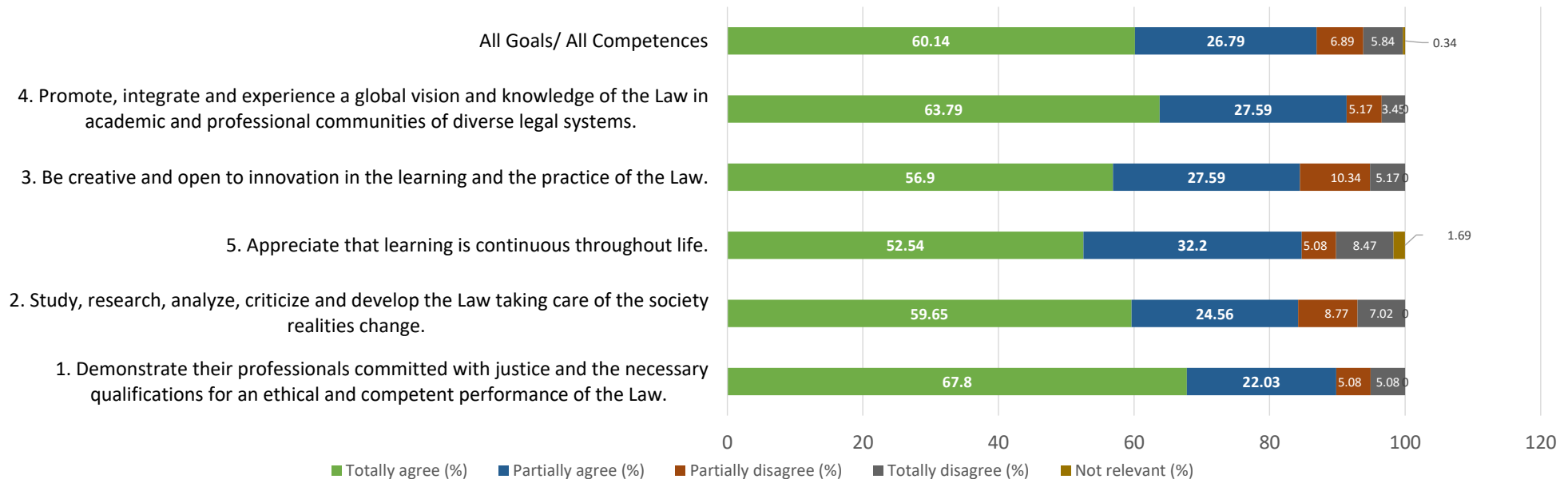

Participants' Opinion on School Achievement of Goals and Competences



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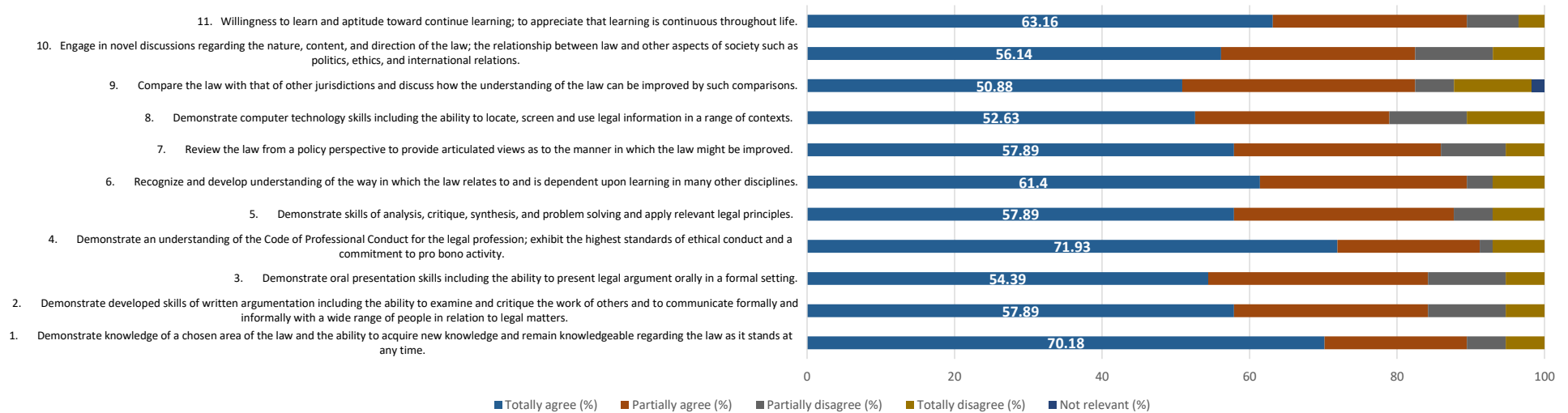

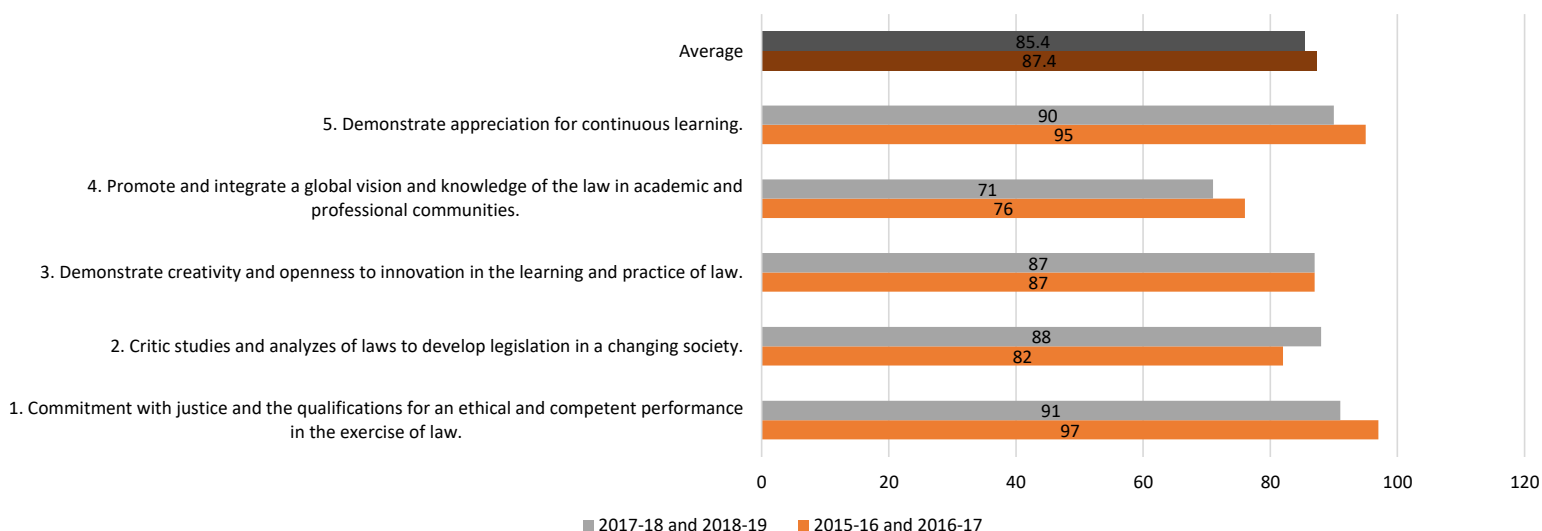

Level of Satisfaction with School's Goals Achivement Expressed by Alumni



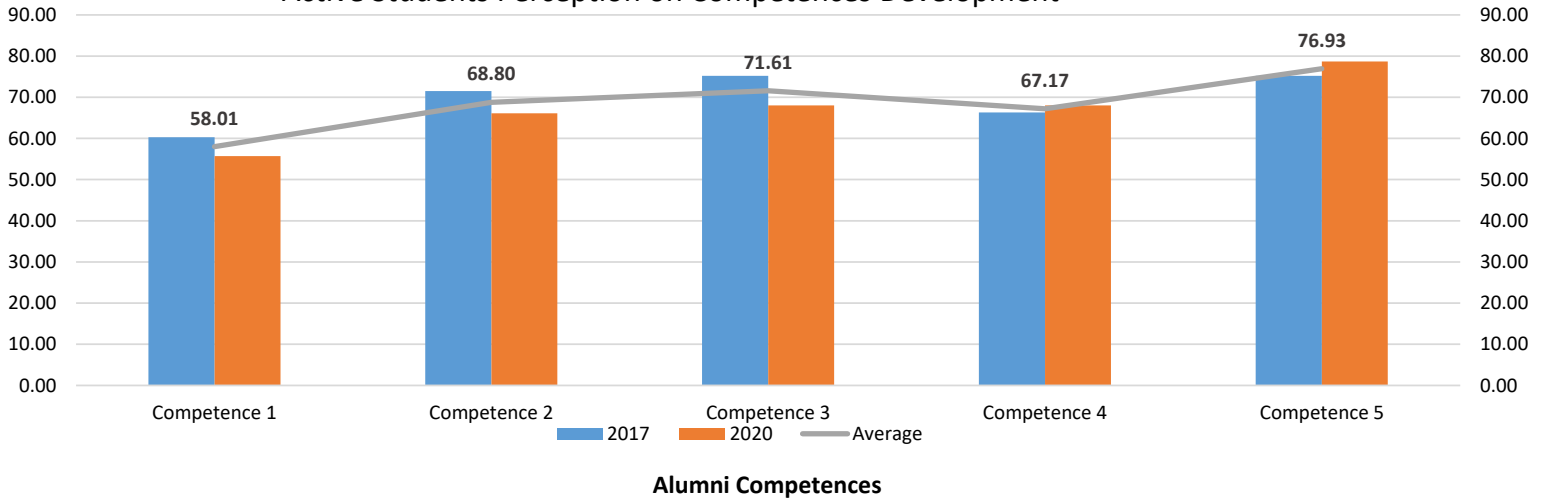

Satisfaction with classroom assessment experience



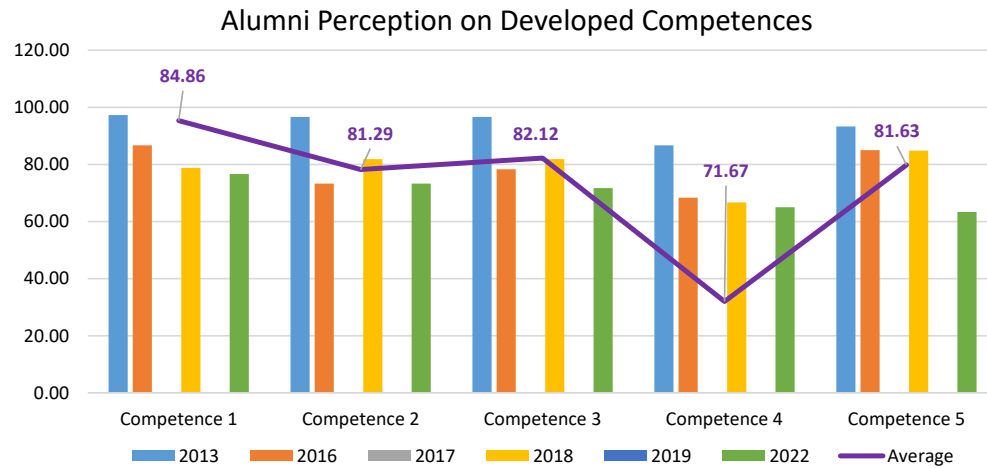

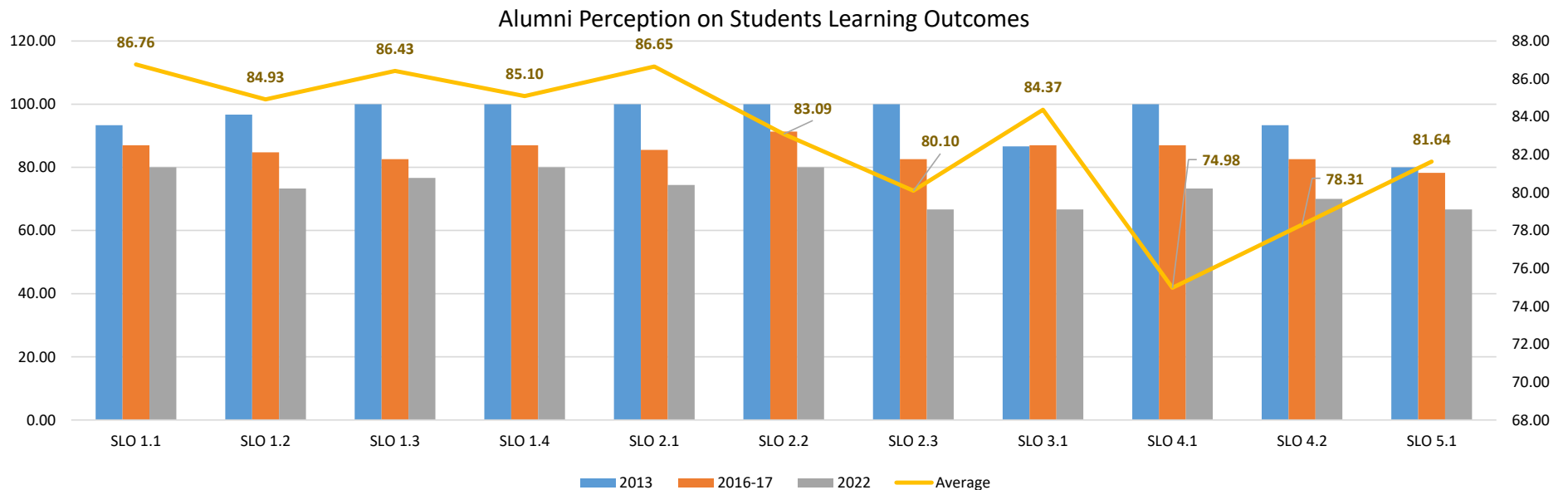

Score of Course Assessment Process by Criteria and Total



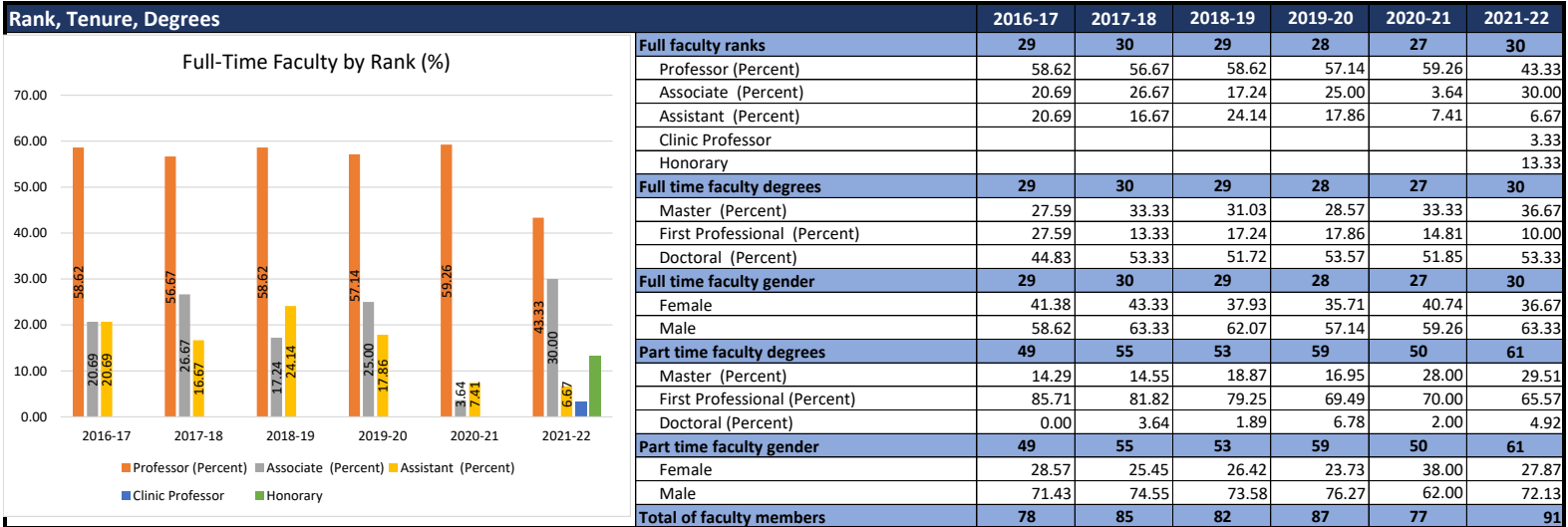

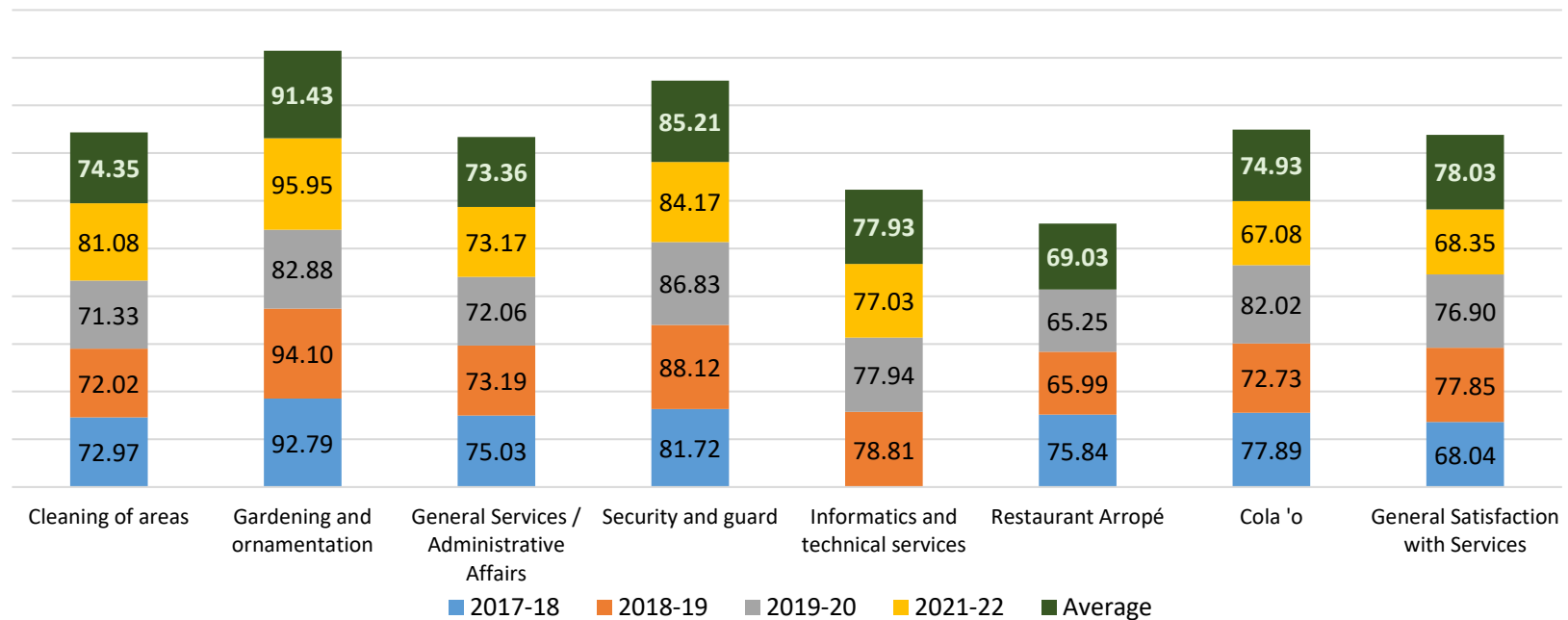
